ANNUAL REPORT

The Club is a professional Life Saving organisation and has three main activities, which are:-

- Maintaining Beach Patrols on Bulcock Beach, Caloundra;
- Training and development of Members and the Public in Life Saving techniques; &
- Increase Participation & Volunteering.

The present Clubhouse was constructed in 1989 and is located adjacent to Bulcock Beach, at the western end of the beach. The Clubhouse is constructed on stumps/piles with half the Clubhouse elevated above the beach.

Equipment of the Club is modern and contains all the necessary items of Life Saving Club equipment.

The main rescue equipment is the Inflatable Rescue Boats (IRB), rescue/paddle boards, rescue tubes and first aid equipment.

The Club maintains Beach Patrols during weekends and public holidays over the summer months of the year (September through to May).

Membership of the Club is open for application to any member of the public willing to assist the Club in whatever manner they are able to help the Club achieve its mission. The bulk of membership are people aged 7 to 70 years.

The year 2016 marks the 125th anniversary of the founding of the Royal Life Saving Society in England.

Recognizing the death and suffering caused by drowning and determined to reduce it, champion swimmer William Henry, along with others who shared his passion, founded the Society in 1891.

Since then, the Society and its drowning prevention cause have expanded across the Commonwealth and are now firmly established in twenty-seven countries. Many governments have granted it status as a registered charity, in clear recognition of our humanitarian mission.

Every day, thousands of dedicated volunteers and a small cadre of professional staff work tirelessly to reduce drowning on behalf of the public at large. Their dedication has borne fruit. Over the past 125 years, millions of ordinary citizens have been trained as lifesavers. Many have found themselves in situations where they have relied on their training and thus saved lives.

The Society delivers public awareness and education, lifesaving and lifeguard training, survival swimming, risk management, swim instruction and lifesaving sport. It also advocates for drowning prevention, based on research and sound standards. These initiatives not only save lives and prevent injury but build character and contribute to civil society, which benefits us all.

Member Branches further strengthen our Commonwealth family through the efforts they make to assist other branches to develop and prosper.

The Society has prepared an excellent programme of celebration in which I encourage all Member Branches to take part. It is a splendid opportunity to honour dedicated volunteers and advance our mission of drowning prevention and a drowning-free Commonwealth.

To that end, I am delighted to announce the establishment of the 125th Anniversary Certificate of Merit. This one-time award is limited to 125 individuals who have provided distinguished service to the RLSS. Recipients will be honoured in 2016.

The Royal Life Saving Society

125 years: 1891 to 2016

With the increasing popularity of swimming in the 1880's, drowning, in England & Wales, was on the increase, reaching 3,000 per year. In 1887 twenty-eight year old champion swimmer William Henry recognised that drowning was preventable and knowing something had to be done he petitioned the Royal Humane Society to undertake the training of lifesaving skills. With little interest, no action was taken by the Society. However, William Henry and his journalist friend and water polo player, Archibald Sinclair, followed up with a letter, setting forth a scheme for forming classes of instruction in lifesaving, to which the Society replied the following day; 'the committee can do no more without neglecting the legitimate work of the Society'.

William Henry and Archibald Sinclair then approached the Amateur Swimming Association. The Association appointed a committee, which on the 11th May 1889 made its report. The committee said a committee should be appointed and classes should be held, arranged and financed by local swimming clubs and grants, if necessary, from the Association. Nothing was done.

Henry & Sinclair wrote in the *Swimming Magazine* in 1910; "The neglect of diving, floating, plunging and scientific swimming by ordinary clubs led, in 1891, to the calling of a meeting of seven gentlemen interested in swimming, for the purpose of founding a special club to encourage the arts named, and, in addition, to vigorously carry out instruction, and the recommendations of the Amateur Swimming Association as to the saving of life from drowning." On the 3rd January 1891 William Henry and Archibald Sinclair along with Hewitt Griffin, F W Moses, E W Stafford, W Brickett & C Val Hunter held a meeting at Anderton's Hotel, Fleet Street, London, at which approximately sixty people were in attendance. A committee of twelve was appointed to create the rules and on the **7th February 1891** a General Meeting was held, thus forming the new **The Swimmers' Life Saving Society**. The name was changed within a year to **The Life Saving Society**.

With William Henry as the first Chief Co-Secretary (with Archibald Sinclair), the Life Saving Society headquarters operated from his London home at 8 Bayley Street. The first lecture was given on the 25th May 1891 by Sir Andrew Clark, personal physician to the Prime Minister. The Society moved quickly; the first handbook was published in 1891 and the Bronze Medallion was introduced. In 1892, not only over 30 rescues were recorded (16 by members of The Life Saving Society), but 86 Bronze Medallions were awarded. The first ten female candidates were amongst the 207 Bronze Medallions awarded in 1893. In 1894, 334 medallions and certificates were awarded and in 1897 1,174 were issued, in the UK.

HRH The Duke of York, later King George V, became the President of the Society in 1893 and in 1904 King Edward VII ordered that The Society be recognised as **The Royal Life Saving Society**. Formal Royal Charter was received from King George V in 1924.



The Royal Life Saving Society moved quickly and spread throughout the world. Queen Elizabeth II in her February 2016 congratulatory letter to The Society said “Beginning in England where it was founded, and now in twenty-seven Commonwealth countries, the Society has made great progress, developing programmes, techniques and working with others to achieve results.” William Henry in 1910 is quoted as saying; “The inception of The Royal Life Saving Society was due to the oft-expressed desire to minimise the great loss of life from drowning, to teach those possessed of ordinary courage the best methods of rescue and the resuscitation of the apparently drowned. The desire to save a human life, the thought to lend a hand to a brother in peril, the sympathy with distress which many feel but know little how to express, so greatly underlie the work of The Society that there is little wonder that it has found its way into human hearts far from London, the city of its birth.” In a modern world where companies are considered to have a lifespan of 100 years, it is fitting to quote The Royal Life Saving Society Commonwealth secretariat; “No finer words could be written to describe the Society’s appeal to the best qualities of humankind and to explain why it has long prospered; the very sentiment of which is enshrined in the RLSS motto: **‘Whomsoever you see in distress, recognise in them a fellow human being’.**”

Of the two most important persons in the early life of the Society, Archibald Sinclair (1866-1922) was a less promoted figure compared to William Henry. Henry travelled the world promoting the Society, including Australia. Who was William Henry? He was born



William Nawrocki on the 28th June 1859, to a Polish father and English mother. On return to the UK in 1877, from a long residence in Russia, William dropped his surname, due to the problem English people had in pronouncing Nawrocki. He took the surname Henry by deed poll on the 16th March 1896. Henry was a national and international swimmer, water polo player and diver, and in 1906 became the oldest Olympic medal winner at the age of 46. He also won the English Long Distance Championship (5 to 6 miles) in 1890. He won the Life Saving Championship at the World Championship in Paris in 1900. William Henry was inducted into the International Swimming Hall of Fame (founded 1964), located in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, United States, in 1974. William Henry died aged 68 on the 20th March 1928.

The Royal Life Saving Society came to Australia in 1894, with the first branch being formed in New South Wales. Victoria followed in 1904; Queensland 1905, South Australia 1909, Tasmania 1915 and Western Australia 1924, the year the Society received its Royal Charter of Incorporation. A Supplemental Charter was granted by Queen Elizabeth II in 1958. The Northern Territory branch was formed in 1965 and the Australian Capital Territory in 1975.

The first Royal Life Saving manual, suited to Australian conditions, was published in 1953, under the name ‘The Australian Life Saving Society – Manual of Modern Life Saving Methods’. With mediation under the Commonwealth President, Lord Mountbatten, the new NSW group writing the new manual came back under the ‘Royal’ banner and future editions were published under ‘The Royal Life Saving Society Australia’. Stimulated by the NSW group demand for autonomy, a Commonwealth Council was formed in 1959 with five separate, but closely co-operating branches: London, Australia, Canada, New Zealand and South Africa. The first Commonwealth Council meeting was held in 1961.

Lifesavers train seniors

CHILDREN are often believed to be most at risk of drowning, but it is the over-50s who in fact claim that dubious honour, according to Royal Life Saving Society program facilitator Patricia Barry.

The Grey Medallion is a free Royal Life Saving Society program that is specially designed for those aged 50 and older. This program is designed to teach lifesaving and emergency care skills that could save a life.

Ms Barry said participants would not be required to wear budgie smugglers or swim a marathon. "You'd be totally wrong in assuming that the grey medallion is a swimming course," she said.

"You don't have to be fit and you don't even have to be able to swim to complete it. "We teach CPR, first aid, how to use a defibrillator, marine stings, and water-wise skills and the dry-rescue skills section shows people how to help in an aquatic emergency without even getting into the water."

Ms Barry said many older Sunshine Coasters enjoyed water activities and cared for their grandchildren, or were packing up to travel as grey nomads.

"This free two-day course

is essential for carers and travellers," she said. "It could potentially save the life of someone you love - it covers how to act in emergency situations both on land and around the

water."

Ms Barry said everyone was welcome to attend the course, to be run by Ithaca Caloundra City Life Saving Club, on Saturday, August 22-23, at BreakFree Resort,

Danger of drones

TOURISTS visiting scenic seaside towns are being warned to think about air safety before flying drones to take photos and videos. The Civil Aviation Safety Authority has received reports of drones being flown close to aircraft flight paths in tourist towns. Flying a drone in an area where aircraft are operating at low altitudes poses a risk of collision or distracting pilots, CASA said. Drones should not be flown within 5km of an airport and should be kept below 400ft - 130m.

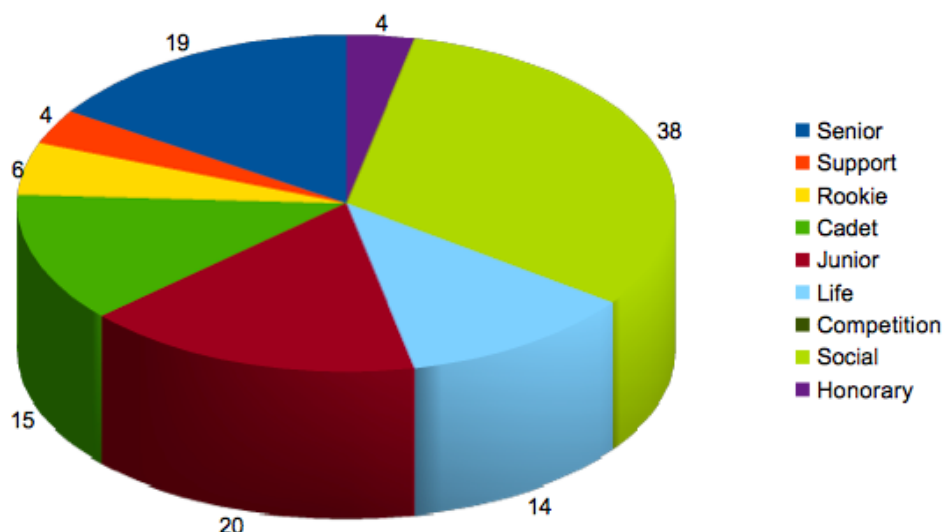

Senior member Gary Smith has built a relationship with Bunnings who have donated maintenance materials including a new first aid sink, paint and many small hardware items. Gary also suggested the idea of using a second 'Bob' as a donation tin, which was constructed by Richard Buddle, for use at the other end of the beach. This has no doubt contributed to the increase in collections this season. This second Bob has a name, 'Bulcock Bob' and has hashtag #BulcockBob.

The Club received funding from The Council of the Ageing (COTA) to run another Grey Medallion Course in Seniors Week 2015 (August 2015) for 35 participants. The Club has been lucky to again receive this funding for the 2016/17 season.

The Club has again been supported by BreakFree Grand Pacific, who has sponsored the Club by formally allowing the Club to run the two day Grey Medallion Course and hold its Awards Function at its function venue, in exchange for uniform sponsorship on the Club's new rash shirts.

The Club has received funding (\$4,850) from the Federal Government Department of Social Security to purchase equipment and small items to assist volunteers.

The Club has also been awarded grants totalling \$32,670 from the Queensland Government, Office of Liquor and Gaming Regulation to purchase a new All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV) and Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB). These items will be purchased at an appropriate time next season.

Four members of the Club travelled to Glendon during November 2015 to act as Lifeguards for the Town's Christmas Party which was hosted by Glencore Mine. These members worked on a volunteer basis, and the Glencore Mine donated \$1,250 to the Club as a result.

REPORT ON GLENCORE MINE CHILDRENS CHRISTMAS PARTY

A team of skilled members of the Club were selected to provide lifeguarding service for Glencore Town Christmas Party and attended Glenden (190 KM West of Mackay) on Saturday 21 November 2015. Those who attended were:

Each lifesaver was equipped with:

- a two way radio,
- a rescue tube,
- a whistle,
- goggles,
- a lifeguard uniform,
- a bum bag first aid kit

Members met at Brisbane Airport at 8.15am on Saturday 21 November 2015 for a 9.15am flight to Mackay, flying Virgin with flight time approximately 1 hour. We arrived at Mackay at 10.35am (approximately 20 minutes early) and upon arrival picked up our AVIS rental car which was a Toyota RAV 4, which comfortably fitted all members and equipment. At 11am we proceed west to Glenden, which is a 190KM drive. On the way we stopped at Woolworths at Walkerston for supplies (water, apples, muesli bars, etc).

We arrived at Glenden at 1.30pm and obtained our room keys from the site office, which doubled as a mess hall and was located in the centre of Glenden Town.

We proceeded to our accommodation which was on the Westerns side of town, each lifeguard being assigned a one bedroom (with ensuite) unit, in blocks of four units. The accommodation was clean and tidy, and importantly was air-conditioned.

Glenden is a town that was originally established by Mt Isa Mines, however the local mine is now operated by Glencore, current population 750 with most occupants working for the mine or supporting the mining industry.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

We proceeded to the pool and arrived at 2pm for our briefing and induction. The Glenden pool is in the centre of town and adjoins the police and ambulance stations. The pool is an open air facility with a 50m pool (2m depth at the deeper end) and small circular toddler play pool of 30cm depth.

At the deep end of the larger pool, a floating water slide device had been installed for the day, with half the pool allocated for such device. Two lifeguards were allocated to monitor this device, two for the shallow end (which was for swimming) and one lifeguard for the toddler pool. It was agreed that Lifeguards would rotate at 30 minutes intervals.



The party also had the following

Free BBQ
Free fairy floss
Three inflatable slides (which were not installed in the pool area)
Various other stalls
Free Mr Frosty Ice Cream Van
Santa (arriving on a golf cart)

The pool gates opened at 3pm and lifeguards were in position from 3pm to 6pm. A check under the water slide was completed approximately every 15 minutes. The following incidents were noted during the patrol:

Two assists ~ one by Paul Seto and one by Paul Barry, both of week swimmers near the water slide.
Two reported first aid incidents (however neither were handled by lifeguards).

Lifeguards worked well together and communication with the two way radios greatly assisted the patrol. The party concluded at 6pm with the pool being closed. Lifeguards were able to assist clean and test the floatation device (by Paul Barry and Sarah Clegg) before leaving the facility.

After a quick debrief the team then return by car to our accommodation to shower and change for our evening meal. We met at 7.15pm and drove to the mess hall. The meal was well supplied, with optional steak cooked to order. Following our meal we proceeded next door to the town 'Club' for evening drinks. Following a round of drinks, all members were tired, so we returned to our accommodation and all retired.

We woke on Sunday morning at 6am, and met at the car at 6.30am with bags packed. We then proceeded to drive to the mess hall for a cooked breakfast and to return our room keys. Following breakfast we proceeded to return to Mackay by vehicle and the two hour drive was interesting. We checked in at Mackay airport and return by carrier Virgin to Brisbane Airport arriving at approximately 12.15pm.

Lifeguard worked well together and conducted a professional service for the local community of Glenden. During the debrief feedback received was good and no areas of improvement were noted.

Plans for next season

The Club will continue its annual induction and re-accreditation (which is to be completed by 31 October 2016) and will include an update with respect to induction policies (code of conduct, policies, procedures, etc)

The following processes will be adopted for new members for next season:

- Two member sign-on days (September and December), which will be advertised on the Clubhouse noticeboard;
- Bronze Courses will be conducted over three weeks following the sign-on days (three one day courses which will include water and theory sessions)
- An assessment will be completed at the end of the course;
- When new members successfully pass the course, they will be given their uniform;
- Members will be unable to patrol until they have completed the assessment and obtained their Blue Card;
- Successful completion of the course will be a pre-requisite to membership; and
- New members to elect a roster or regular patrol shift.

I am pleased to report that the 2015/16 Season has been a successful one for all training activities undertaken by club members. In line with this, the main goal for next season's training will be to reinforce member's understanding of, and adherence to, these changing policies and

procedures, all of which will be addressed in formal training workshops or reaccreditation sessions.

PATROLLING

Patrols are conducted on all weekends and public holidays during the summer season and are overseen by:

- * Club officials (Regular unannounced inspections carried out);
- * The Royal Life Saving Society (members of the Combined Clubs Committee); and
- * Surf Life Saving (SLSA Duty Officers visit the Club regularly and provide guidance and advice).

The Club holds a Patrol Service Agreement with Sunshine Coast Regional Council, wherein the Club agrees to patrol the beach from September School Holidays through to the beginning of May, during designated hours. Council Beach Life Guards (subcontracted to Surf Life Saving Queensland, since October 2012) utilise the Club facilities and equipment for weekday beach patrols. The aforementioned groups ensure the quality of patrols is maintained to the highest standard. Every patrol has an allocated Patrol Captain who must be qualified for control of all of the patrol functions (i.e.: IRB, Radio, First Aid, etc)

Every patrol member must wear the Club patrol uniform, which consists of red shorts, yellow shirt (indicating 'Beach Patrol') and a quartered red and yellow skull cap, whilst on patrol.

All First aid cases are continued to be treated in the first aid room, unless the patient is located away from the Clubhouse, in which case they are treated at the scene.

Local Laws advisory – the Club records incidents where advice is given to the public in respect to local law matters including:

- * Dogs within the bathing reserve;
- * Fishing within the bathing reserve;
- * Smoking between the flags; and
- * Boats/Jet Skis in the bathing reserve.



JUNIOR LIFEGUARD PROGRAM

The Club commenced its Junior Life Guard Program (similar to Nippers) in 2002 and continued it again this season. The Program is a fun environment where games and competitions are used to teach the children:-

- Water Safety;
- Basic Rescue Techniques;
- Safe Swimming Habits;
- Basic Resuscitation; and
- Team work & responsibility.

The program is conducted by members of the Club and all sessions (and children) are logged and tracked. Children progress through an introductory period of basic water safety; and will then progress through the 'Swim & Survive' (*Love 2 Swim*) series of awards. This progression would be expected to take between 1 and 4 years depending of the child's age and abilities. After the Swim & Survive awards, Junior Lifeguards are named as Cadet Lifeguards, and they aim for the 'Bronze Star' award, which is a rescue award just below the Bronze Medallion. The target age for Bronze Star is 12 years old, and once Junior Lifeguards obtain their Bronze Star, they can assist with beach patrol duties. As the program develops, new strands have been added, to cater for the changing demographics of membership. In the 2007/08 season a Rookie Strand was added to the program, which includes members from 13/14 to 16 years.

Strands:

Junior Aged 6 to 11 years old. Swim and Survive Series.

Cadet Aged 11 to 12 years old. Bronze Star Award.

Rookie Aged 13/14 to 16 years old. They are encouraged to complete the Bronze Medallion in the year they turn 14. Once members complete their Bronze Medallion they are able to assist beach patrols as a qualified member.

The Junior Lifeguard Program conducts two training sessions each week:-

- Sunday morning at 8.00am (2 x 1 hour session) on Bulcock Beach

JUNIOR LIFEGUARD ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Junior Lifeguards began on Sunday the 25th of October 1915 with 34 active juniors, and 1 junior waiting medical clearance due to a broken clavicle. Eleven of the juniors were new members to the club. Swim tests and inductions had gone well in the lead up to the start and all team volunteers wore red junior lifeguard shirts for easy recognition.

The volunteer team consisted of:
Jodie Buddle – Junior Administration
Henry Webb - Chief Instructor
Kate Bennett - Coach
Richard Buddle - Equipment Manager.

We were also assisted by Marie Dunne and Dom Stower for water safety. Lynda Barry and Paul Barry were also on duty to assist with the transition of the new team.

A supply of new caps and shirts were purchased as were Junior Lifeguard rash shirts. Rash shirts are optional for juniors to wear.

Purchases were made throughout the season to aid the development of the program. Such items were 10 new soft paddleboards, flags and flag poles to mark out use of the beach, ropes and administration equipment.

During the season parents were asked to assist with various equipment roles. This has led to Matt Hanlon and Brian Manning coming on board for the 2016/17 season. Kristy Taylor assisted the administrator with sign on duties. She will continue this on a fortnightly basis next year. Marie Dunne will also join the team and we are currently speaking to other club members to utilise their expertise.

The 2016/17 season had two groups running. Junior Lifeguards commenced at 8am and Cadet Lifeguards at 9am. Generally the program ran as follows: 15 min stretch/warm up, 20min beach based activity, 20min water based activity and a 5 min warm down debrief.

Juniors ran a BBQ for members in November to encourage community team building and raise some funds. It raised \$139 and allowed people to work together and get to know the other parents. A canteen was open when volunteer staffing allowed. This raised a small amount of money.

As the season progressed the administration team in consultation with the Club Captain introduced Junior Lifeguard Beach Patrols. Junior Lifeguards holding a Level 7 or Bronze Star were invited to do 2 hour patrols with the senior members. This was very popular and all sessions were booked out. Senior Members reported that the Junior Lifeguards (12-13 years of age) were very attentive, eager to learn and retained the newly learnt signals and instructions from week to week. Two cadets, Alyce Webb (graduating from Juniors) and Melissa Buddle continued to do patrols after the junior season had ended building up to doing full half day patrols.



JUNIOR LIFEGUARD ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

The season ended on the 13th of March 2016 with the Club Carnival. Airlie Beach Whitsunday Lifesaving club were invited to attend. The Club provided accommodation at the clubhouse; Junior Lifeguards provided a welcome sausage sizzle and food for breakfast both days. Other support was provision of caps and entry fees.

Richard Buddle was instrumental in coordination of the carnival program which ran effectively and ahead of time. Parents, Senior Members and outside volunteers made the day run smoothly despite a little rain. Alyce Webb was named Junior Lifeguard of the Year and Melissa Buddle the McClelland Trophy for most patrols. Other awards were given and can be found on the website.

After the season, juniors were invited to attend training sessions at Nambour Pool with Jeanie Baxter-Reid. This was successful with most weeks having 10 Junior Lifeguards attending.

After the season ended some families chose to get together for the children to swim laps and build fitness. This was not a club activity but as swimming lessons/training is encouraged it was great that the families had the initiative to get together to build strength in the off season.

This then lead to a team from Ithaca going to the Queensland Schools Pool Lifesaving Competition. Juniors joined other members of their respective schools but wore their Junior Lifeguard uniform and proudly represented our club.

It is intended that Jodie, Richard and Henry will take a group (with their parents) to the National Pool Life Saving competition in Melbourne next January. However, this will depend on the availability of a trained trainer to allow club training. In the off season Paul Barry will run a Teacher of Lifesaving course so to qualify some members as trainers. This will allow the development of the National Team and official training sessions.

Both Jodie and Richard have completed first aid courses and Richard has achieved his Patrol Bronze Medallion during the season.

Richard and Jodie attended the Official Level 1 Course at the Gold Coast and were then Officials for the 3 day Australian Pool Life Saving Championships (January 2016). They also attended the Australian Time Trials and assisted as officials (May 2016).

We are looking forward to another full season with Swim Tests being held on the 11th of September 2016.

TREASURER'S REPORT

I wish to advise that the Club's finances remain sound. The Club has operated at a surplus this financial year with one of the key reasons being that budgeted expenditure on the Kitchen (\$6,000) and concreting the underside storage area was deferred.

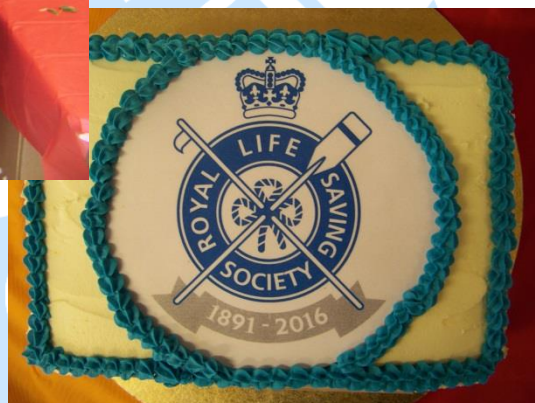
